

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

It also delved into different aspects like what Rudram is, how its daily practice is an integral yoga, and when to chant it. When chanted with an understanding of the meaning of


# The Rudram is a practical text to experience divinity in everything and everywhere, which Swami exhorts us to do.

the Namakam and Chamakam, the benefits multiply. While space constraints make it difficult to go into the complete meaning of each anuvaka of the Namakam and Chamakam, here are some highlights.

# Meaning of the Namakam Namakam Anuvaka 1

The first anuvaka of the Namakam is a prayer to the Lord to pacify His anger against transgressions of divine commandments and pray for His blessings to help us tread the right path. We pray for forgiveness of our trespasses and seek the Lord's love and grace. Three mantras are offered as praise, prayer, and salutation to Rudra as the Sun god who is directly seen by all of us, including animals and trees. The spectacular display of the beauty and glory of the Sun from the time it emerges on the eastern horizon at dawn till it merges with the western horizon at dusk is always a wonderful sight that gives joy to all.

Worshipping the Sun also has many physical and mental health benefits, such as providing Vitamin D and making one cheerful. For spiritual seekers, worship of the Sun god during sandhyavandana (daily duty of those initiated into the Gayatri mantra), helps take them toward God, sharpens their intellect, and illumines them. That is why, over thousands of years, people of all tribes and faiths worldwide have worshipped the Sun god. This includes



native tribes and people in the continents of North America, South America, Africa, Oceania, and Europe.

At the end of the first anuvaka, there is a beautiful and powerful mantra that begins, "Namaste Astu Bhagawan Vishveshwaraya..." Here, one offers salutations to Rudra as the Lord of the universe, who is self-effulgent, the three-eyed one, the consumer of the fire of the three periods of time, the conqueror of death, and the



Lord of all bestowing health, auspiciousness, and liberation itself.

Anuvakas 2 through 9 describe the various aspects of Rudra, including how Rudra is the supreme Lord with no leader above Him. Though some references are pertinent to conditions prevalent in Vedic times, the message is relevant for all ages and everyone as it is timeless.

# Namakam Anuvaka 2

The second *anuvaka* describes Him as the Lord of all directions, the indweller of all beings, the one who liberates us from worldly ties, the one who strikes fear in wrong-doers, and the one who bestows blessings on the righteous. Rudra is also worshipped as the one who resides in trees with green leaves and the Lord and protector of forests. It shows the importance of revering nature as God, protecting it, and not polluting it. The present environmental initiatives by various governments and organizations, including the SSSIO, are spiritual at their core, thus worshipping Rudra.

#### Namakam Anuvaka 3

The third anuvaka shows how Rudra is all-pervasive in all beings. He is present in those who protect the harvested land, as well as the thieves and cheaters. Rudra is present in those who are sitting, lying down, sleeping, awake, standing, and moving about quickly. He is also present in general and professional assemblies, and is the head of those assemblies. This indicates that we should be aware of Rudra in all our mundane activities, which Rudra Himself pervades.

### Namakam Anuvaka 4

The fourth anuvaka states that Rudra is present in people with dispassion, as well as those indulging in material pleasures. He is present in chariots and charioteers (a reference to modern automobiles and chauffeurs), carpenters, potters, blacksmiths, people who make weapons (such as weapon manufacturers), fishermen, bird

hunters, dogs and their owners, hunters, etc. This indicates that Rudra is our protector in accidents that might occur due to manufacturing defects or usage of equipment when we think of Him.

#### Namakam Anuvaka 5

The fifth anuvaka describes how Rudra is responsible for creation and dissolution. It states that He has a white complexion with a blue neck caused by the halahala poison He swallowed to save the universe. He is in monks with tufted hair and those with clean-shaven heads; He is in both running waters and still waters. We salute Rudra, who is present in dwarfs and giants, as well as children and old people. He is present in all stages of life.

#### Namakam Anuvaka 6

The sixth anuvaka further elaborates on Rudra's all-pervasiveness, stating how He is there in the youngest ones, the oldest ones, the middlings, in heaven and hell, in Vedic prayers and Upanishads, in sound and resound, and in mighty armies. Rudra is also worshipped as being present in humans, forests, creepers, and all that grows in the forests.

# Namakam Anuvaka 7

The seventh anuvaka states how Rudra manifests in the ambassadors of peace, the ones who fight for the right cause, muddy waters, lakes, rivers, clouds, lightning, thunder, rain, summer winds, autumn breezes, tornadoes, hailstorms, and snow. It ends with salutations to Rudra, who dwells in all objects and places as their ultimate protector.

## Namakam Anuvaka 8

The eighth anuvaka is considered the most important one. When chanting it, people ring the bell to draw attention to the chant. It offers salutations to Rudra, who, with Goddess Uma by His side, removes all our sorrows. It also salutes Him as the Rudra who gives joy and is the loving protector of all beings. It extols Rudra as taking the form of the five elements, the Pranava, Om, trees, and the creator of worldly and spiritual treasures. The mantra 'Om Namah Shivaya,' extolled as the highest, is part of this anuvaka. The anuvaka also describes Him as the protector, the one who takes us across the ocean of samsara (worldly life), and the one present in foam, running waters, and sand dunes.

#### Namakam Anuvaka 9

The ninth anuvaka states how Rudra manifests as narrow roads, wide highways, stone-ridden roads, huts, mansions, beds, cowsheds, caves, whirlpools, waterfalls, dust particles, dry leaves, green leaves, grasslands, grassless lands, and the very atoms. Apart from showing His all-pervasiveness, these also indicate the benefits of chanting this mantra, such as good sleep, freedom from dust allergies, etc., since Rudra pervades everything.

#### Namakam Anuvaka 10

The tenth anuvaka states that Rudra is the supreme physician, curing humans and animals of their physical and mental afflictions while bestowing the greatest prosperity and auspiciousness on our parents, grandparents, children, servants, and other loved ones. Here, Rudra is invoked as the omniscient and omnipotent Lord to show His peaceful and auspicious form. Prayers are made so that He may direct His weapons not on us but on our outer and inner enemies, thereby granting us peace, protection, and happiness.

## Namakam Anuvaka 11

In the eleventh anuvaka, we pray for the grace and blessings of various rudras, the aspects of the omnipresent and omnipotent Rudra who exist in the earth, skies, netherworlds, and heavens. This is also a prayer for protection while walking on different roads, eating food, from diseases, from all directions, including above and below, and from

negative people and emotions. We surrender to Lord Rudra in thought, word, and deed and pray that people and things we dislike and those that dislike us and cause us sorrow may be destroyed by Him for our peace and happiness.

# The Namakam also contains the powerful Mrityunjaya mantra:

Om tryambakam yajaamahe sugandhim pushtivardhanam Urvaarukamiva bandhanaanmrityormuksheeya maamritaat

In this mantra, the Lord is extolled, adored, and worshipped as the three-eyed one with a sweet and wonderful fragrance who gives us strength and energy while getting rid of all our bondage as easily as a mature cucumber drops off its creeper. The three eyes of Lord Shiva are the Sun on His right side, the Moon on His left side, and fire in the center. The fragrance is of love and beauty. It is also a prayer for spiritual strength, to take us from death to immortality, to remind us that though the body and mind may disappear, the eternal Atma is always present.

In the end, the Lord is praised with a prayer to protect us from illness and negativity by the strength of our good deeds and worship. It also contains a beautiful mantra that portrays the glory of God that divinizes and blesses everything that comes in contact with it. It says, "This hand of mine is blessed that it came in contact with God. It can cure all ills - physical, mental, and spiritual."

# Meaning of the Chamakam

This contains prayers to the Lord to fulfill desires as per dharma. Lord Krishna says that four kinds of devotees seek Him - those who want release from suffering, those who desire wealth, those who are spiritual seekers, and the wise who love God for God's sake. Chamakam allows one to seek everything directly from the Lord.

#### Chamakam Anuvaka 1

In the first anuvaka, the prayer is for food, energy, strength to do yajnas (which Swami defines as activities undertaken for the good of all beings), physical health, healthy organs, good memory, fluent speech, pure mind, and comfortable life in old age.

## Chamakam Anuvaka 2

In the second anuvaka, the prayer is for leadership skills, cooperation of people, righteous anger, good judgment, right mind, discrimination, enjoyment of sports and games, and the ability to do righteous and noble deeds.

## Chamakam Anuvaka 3

This is the most popular anuvaka of the Chamakam, chanted as an independent prayer. In the third anuvaka, the prayer is for worldly happiness, spiritual benefits, performing virtuous deeds during the day, enjoying good sleep at night, earning wealth by righteous means, and good thoughts. It also prays for intellectual honesty, fearlessness, protection from major diseases and minor illnesses, and medicines for good health.

# Chamakam Anuvaka 4

In the fourth anuvaka, the prayer is for wholesome food-milk, honey, ghee (clarified butter), fruits, juices, pulses, cereals, grams, etc. We also pray that our speech be sweet and pleasant and that our ears hear pleasant words.

#### Chamakam Anuvaka 5

In the fifth anuvaka, the prayer is for cooperation from nature and yields from the land like iron, gold, lead, silver, wealth obtained by one's efforts, good inheritance, etc. This important prayer to Rudra is also for knowledge, strength, willpower, and other resources for doing daily spiritual practices with purity and joy to attain the goal of life, namely, God-realization.

## Chamakam Anuvaka 6

In the sixth *anuvaka*, the prayer is for blessings from various demigods, who are manifestations of the supreme being with different names and forms like Indra, Sun, Moon, Rain God, Fire God, Goddess of learning, Divine Physicians, Earth, Sky, etc.

# Chamakam Anuvaka 7

In the seventh *anuvaka*, the prayer is for blessings from various planets and galaxies to be cordial, supportive, and beneficial for all our worldly and other-worldly efforts. It also prays for knowledge, resources, and the will to perform spiritual rituals and practices. It is interesting to note that as the *Chamakam* seeks various material benefits from Rudra, it makes it a point to focus on spiritual practices and goals repeatedly.

# Chamakam Anuvaka 8

In the eighth anuvaka, the prayer extolls God, who helps us perform the yajna as a selfless service to humanity. The prayer is for wood, clarified butter, people to perform the yajna, food offerings, venue for the yajna, specific mantras for the deities, and resources needed to make the yajna successful. Yajna, as per Swami, is a selfless action to serve all creation and God.

#### Chamakam Anuvaka 9


In the ninth anuvaka, the prayer is for steadfastness in spiritual practices, discipline, devotion, performing various austerities, and the energy to do selfless activities. There is also a prayer to acquire knowledge of the Vedas, essential mantras, and blessings from the deities.


## Chamakam Anuvaka 10

In the tenth anuvaka, the prayer is for cattle, which was the primary source of wealth for people in ancient times. In modern times, this would refer to various devices, tools, appliances, and resources needed for one's comfortable living, growth, and career. This is also a prayer for long life, strength, and blessings related to the body, mind, and sensory organs, including eyes and ears, mind, and speech, highlighting the holistic development of an individual.

## Chamakam Anuvaka 11

In the eleventh *anuvaka*, the prayer pertains to various odd numbers–1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11, 13, 15, 17, 19, 21, 23, 25, 27, 29, 31, and 33–indicative of divinity and various even numbers–2, 4, 8, 12, 16, 20, 24, 28, 32, 36, 40, 44, 48–indicative of human existence. Vedic hymns contain many invocations and prayers with coded numbers. Such coded series of numbers give insights into creation and its functioning. The numbers also refer to various aspects of DNA, the biological code of the living world.





The numbers have great relevance in philosophical doctrines, the discussion of which is beyond the scope of this editorial. Finally, one prays for energy to do more good deeds based on good thoughts and words. We can also add to this list all we desire. May those desires be for the well-being of all, including ourselves.

# Rudram is a Way to Constantly Experience Divinity

Sri Rudram, as evident from Swami's teachings, is not just a chant but a pathway to experiencing the divine within and without. It is the bridge between the finite and the infinite, guiding humanity toward a life of love, peace, and Self-realization. It is not a bundle of sacred mantras alone, but the highest Vedic hymn, encompassing all aspects of human life and integrating all three Yogas of Karma, Bhakti, and Jnana.

The mantras contained therein have meanings at three levels-literal (prati padartham),

inner (bhavartha), and divine (paramartha). The third one represents the highest knowledge, which has to be revealed from within or by the grace of an Avatar, like our beloved Bhagawan. It is unique and inspiring for an Avatar to explain the meaning of Vedic aphorisms and scriptures—how blessed we all are!

The story of the Nayanar saint, Rudra Pashupati Nayanar, is apt for highlighting the impact of Rudram. He is one of the 63 revered Nayanars, Shaivite (worshippers of Shiva) saints known for their unwavering devotion to Lord Shiva. His life is a profound example of steadfast faith and service to the divine. A devout worshipper of Lord Shiva, he would sneak out to the outskirts of the village daily. He would bathe in the chilling waters of a waterfall, chanting the Rudram all the while. Based on the meaning of the Namakam, He experienced Lord Shiva embracing him in the form of the waterfall and touching and blessing him in the form of the wind. He even saw Lord Shiva in the trees and birds. One day, there was torrential rain, and he had to wade through knee-deep water. He was lost in the throes of bliss, experiencing Lord Shiva holding his feet! On another occasion, when a thief took away his possessions, he was overjoyed and expressed gratitude to Rudra for removing the obstacles in his spiritual path ("...Taskaranam Pataye Namaha," meaning that the Lord is the chief of thieves!). Thus, in his daily life, this great saint experienced Rudra by translating the inner meaning of the mantras into all his actions and experiences.

Thus, the *Rudram* is a practical text to experience divinity in everything and everywhere, which Swami exhorts us to do. Let us chant the Rudram with love and purity, sanctifying our lives and attaining liberation. Jai Sai Ram.

or uneducated, high or low, they see the world through the glasses of their own prejudices and predilections, and they condemn or extol it to please themselves!

# Sow The Seeds Of Love And Harvest Peace

The proper study of mankind is man, for man is the center of all things. And, in man, the mind has to be studied, controlled, and regulated. His thoughts originate in the mind; they express themselves through words and are manifested through deeds. These three have to be properly coordinated by the intellect, or else life turns into a tragedy. The mind has to be trained to develop a taste for the good and the godly, not for money and material gains. Money comes and goes, but morality comes and grows. Man, in his ignorance, asserts that he lives for himself only, eats and drinks to appease his hunger and thirst, and looks after his health and comforts only.

Two individuals may be sleeping on the same bed, but each has dreams that meander independently into strange regions of their own. But the truth is quite different! This selfish attitude, which curbs and curtails one's interests to oneself, and their aggrandizement, is really 'death.' Contraction is extinction. Expansion is life. Man has to feel that he is a limb of the society into which he was born and which has fostered him and fed him with ideals and ideas. Spiritual life is not an isolated existence. Man has to sow the seeds of love in his heart and harvest peace. He should share that peace with all. "Bhumaiva sukham",

say the Vedas (Chandogya Upanishad). This means that there is happiness only in the vast, the limitless, and the huge; not in the little, the small, and the limited. Love leads to expansion; hatred leads to contraction and death. This is the fundamental teaching of the scriptures of *Sanathana Dharma* (path of eternal wisdom).

# Peace Has to Emerge from Within

But, seeing the advances in science and technology, you have lost balance. Man has learned to walk on the moon, to live in the depths of the ocean, to penetrate the deepest crusts of earth, but, alas, it is a pity that he has not learned how to live on earth and let others live, too. How can man achieve happiness and peace of mind, flying high or swimming deep? He also has to carry his troubles and worries, fears and failings with him to those places. He cannot feel light and loveable unless he rids himself of these burdens. Peace has to emerge from within; it cannot be obtained from outside.

Science has its vision directed outward, toward gadgets and machinery providing worldly comforts and convenience. The scientist examines the objective world of matter; he tries to excel in external vision. The Saint examines the soul and develops internal vision. The Scientist plans yantra (machines), and the Saint relies on mantra (sacred words). Balance can be restored only by cultivating inner vision. This has to be done even in schools and colleges. They have neglected this aspect for far too long.

If you examine the nature of the mind, you

will find that it is very much akin to the lens of a camera. The body is the camera, the mind is the lens, the heart is the photographic media, thought is the flash, and intelligence is the switch. Turn the lens toward the source of happiness, not to the

seat of anxiety and fear; then, you will be rewarded with a fine picture imprinted on your heart. It is difficult, nay, well-nigh impossible, to turn the lens in this direction, saints, and seers tell us, for the mind is truly like a monkey! Why, it is even more wayward than a monkey because it jumps from one perch to another that is miles away in space and centuries away in time, in less than a wink! The mind jumps from one desire to another, entangling us in its coils. Reduce desire, evict the ego, eject anger, and the mind will be your slave instead of being your master.

# Love without Duty is Divine

Prema (love) is the master key that can achieve all this. That is why I say,


Start the day with Love; Spend the day with Love, Fill the day with Love: End the day with Love; This is the way to God.

On this path, you will not be waylaid by anger, lust, or greed. You will only have the company of the good and proper facilities for speedy progress. Do your duty with love, as if you are thereby adoring God. Today, many leaders are clamoring for sweccha (freedom). The word sweccha is derived from two root words, swa (Atma) and iccha (desire). So, real freedom is following the Atma. Real freedom is gained only when you are free of the negative influence of passions like lust, envy, pride, greed, and hate. Sweccha does not mean pursuing any and every desire that arises in your mind. It means the inclination of your true Self toward God. If you are inclined toward God, the passions that enslave you will be rendered powerless. Then, you will do your 'duty' as swa-iccha, for you will love it with all your heart.



Duty without love is deplorable; duty with love is desirable; love without duty is divine. Sweccha means the best interests of the individual, the purest thought that emerges from within, for his own good. That means all imitation is barred. Follow the dictates of your clear conscience. Do not copy the wishes and resolutions of someone else. This is what the blind man does. Very often, he follows an equally blind man. God is enshrined in your heart; He is always ready to guide you. He does not appreciate external pomp and exhibitionistic behavior. He does not calculate the number of hours you did bhajan (group devotional singing), or japam (repetition of the Lord's name), or the number of miles you walked doing Nagarasankeerthana (group devotional singing on the streets). God examines the purity of your heart, as evident from your words and deeds.

Do not preach; practice. In politics, in the field of administration, in schools and colleges, and in spiritual institutions everywhere, we have an abundance of preachers but a famine of practitioners. Heroes on platforms prove themselves zeroes when they descend to the ground. Therefore, demonstrate in your own lives how love can



confer peace and joy, how all faiths lead to the same goal, and how all men are brothers. The only message, the only lesson I can impart to you today, is to remind you of the great traditions of *Bharath* (India) and ask you to spread love throughout the length and breadth of this great land. Then, India can again be the spiritual leader of humanity and fill the whole world with divine love.

# Swami's Grace Confers Nearness and Dearness to God

I was born in Torreon, a small city in the north of Mexico. One day, when I was seven years old, I was alone at home, lying on my bed, and waiting for my mother. Suddenly, the bathroom door flung open, and a spiritual being in the form of a man walked out. He came toward me and sat on my bed. He began talking to me, and as He did so, He rubbed my stomach with a circular motion. Though His words were calming and peace emanated from them, I was paralyzed with fear and couldn't move! He sat beside me for a while, talking to me, but the only thing I remember is His parting words, "I have to leave! Take care of your mother." Then He got up from the bed, went back into the bathroom, shut the door, and was gone! The memorable experience was over.

This changed my life forever. I shared this experience with my grandfather, who then introduced me to the study of Spiritism (philosophical doctrines that assert the survival of spirits after death). The goal primarily is to communicate with them. I pursued it in my quest for truth until I became a young adult. Then, my

friends and relatives discouraged me from searching for spirits and encouraged me to enjoy my youth instead. Finally, I decided to give up the pursuit of spirits.

I thought I would say goodbye by attending their group meeting one last time. I went to the meeting on a Thursday, and the director told me, "Brother, we will have a conference about Sai Baba. Would you like to participate?" I replied, "All right! Anyway, this will be my last time here."

The conference began with a video of Sri Sathya Sai Baba. When I saw His image for the first time, I felt my chest exploding! There was a tremendous surge of energy emanating from Him in the video and connecting with me directly. At the same time, I heard a very loud voice in my heart declare, "I want to be like Him!"

The conference that followed had a big impact on me. I used to think constantly about Swami as if I was in love with Him! Some time passed, and one day, during my daily meditation, I saw Swami, who said, "Come, come." Impressed at seeing Him in my meditation, I asked Him, "Sir, what are you doing in my meditation? Please leave..." And Swami left. I thought that perhaps it had been my imagination. The next day, Swami came into my meditation again, saying the same thing, "Come, come." I said, "Sir, I don't know how you managed to enter my meditation. Please leave!" Again, He smiled and left.

On the third day, I pondered more deeply on Swami, trying to understand who He is and how He managed to enter my meditation. I sat down to meditate, and Swami appeared again, and again I told Him, "I am sorry, Sir! I don't know how you enter my meditation, but I must ask you to leave." This time, Swami asked, "Why don't you want to follow me?" I replied, "...because I don't know you. I follow another master. It is not right for me to change masters just like that!" Swami then made a circular movement with His hand, materialized a picture of my master's face, and said, "Look, he's with me." When I saw this, I felt that the time had come, and with conviction, I said, "Yes, I will follow You." Then, Swami smilingly took me to the shade of a tree, where we sat together. The meditation was over.

Many years later, Swami came into my dream and embraced me. I noticed He wore the same clothes as the divine being who came to me when I was seven years old! Throughout my life, He has lovingly and carefully shown His divine Love for me, and His plans for me.

## Raising the Hand to Serve God

What a wonder that out of over eight billion people in the world, only a handful can belong to Swami's Organization! Swami says that only those He calls can get the blessed privilege to serve in His Organization! I thank Him gratefully for letting me be part of His divine mission because it is by His grace,

and His grace alone, that this is possible. He proved this to me by the unique way I joined His Organization.

In 1984, I bought the book 'Sai Baba: Man of Miracles' by Howard Murphet. I also had a strong desire to meet Swami and His Organization members. One day, on the way to my office, my assistant informed me that a lady had called requesting me to sing bhajans that day. The ceremony was about to start, and so I rushed over there. It was very exciting for me to meet a Sai devotee.

When I arrived, I was invited to enter a room full of pictures of different gods, but the main picture on the altar was of Sathya Sai Baba. Listening to bhajans for the first time was wonderful, and I could really feel Sai's presence. At the end of the ceremony, the lady in charge of the Sai Center announced that she could no longer attend the Sai Center, so someone else would have to take her place as the new Center President. She asked the audience to raise their hand if they were interested in the position. I thought that someone might raise his or her hand, but no one did! The lady added that if nobody was willing to become the president, the Center could no longer continue functioning.

Time was running out, and no one raised their hands. My heartbeat started to increase, and to my great surprise, I noticed my left hand rising unbeknownst to me, without even thinking about it! My heart pounded rapidly because I did not know what was happening, while my mind kept screaming, "Oscar! What are you doing? You don't even know these people! You know nothing about all of this! Put your hand down right now!" But at this point, my hand was fully raised, and I couldn't put it down even if I tried!

The president turned, looked at me, and asked.

"Sir, do you know anything about what we do here?"

"No!"

"Do you know what the Sai Organization is?"

"No!"

"Do you have any idea of what this role entails?"

"No!"

"Then, why do you even raise your hand?"

"I don't know... But I want the center to continue its activities. I am willing to do anything for that."

All this happened while my mind was going crazy, asking me what I was doing and telling me I should stop! But nothing like that happened. Swami had decided that I should become the president of the Sai Center immediately on my very first visit. Thank you, Swami, for raising my hand in Your service and making everything proceed according to Your will, not mine.

During my second visit to Prasanthi Nilayam, after morning darshan one day, an impromptu conference took place in the mandir. 
Swami is the Truth that I always looked and yearned for. He was with me in the past, continues to be with me now, and will be forever with me.



"I swear I saw Him. He was smiling at me; He wore an orange robe and had black afro hair. Who is He? A relative of yours?" I asked Kamala because nothing else seemed logical.

Kamala rushed into her bedroom and returned with an old Indian ladies' magazine. She quickly flipped through the pages and pointed at a sepia photograph in it.

"Is this the man you saw?"

"Yes, Yes!" I said. "He was standing in the middle of your living room. I swear I saw Him right here moments ago."

My teacher just had a smile on her face. I returned home in a daze without even asking His name or any details. I was still wondering what had happened! Was this a trick that my mind was playing? Such a thing had never happened to me before. Who was this man who smiled at me? What was His name? For a couple of days, His

image was imprinted in my mind and heart. When I met Kamala the next time, I asked for His name.

"Sai Baba. He is Sai Baba," she said, and then she started playing some *bhajans* sung by Him. My heart went crazy hearing His voice as He sang, "Govinda Krishna Jai." This was the first bhajan I heard. Later, Kamala disclosed to me that she was a Sai devotee.

# I Travel to My Lord in India

After a few days, I was invited to Kamala's house for tea. She wanted me to meet her friend, Mrs. Gail Muniz, who had just returned from India with her husband, Dr. Luis Muniz. They had met Swami for the first time. The couple wanted to start a group and conduct bhajans every Thursday at their place in Colonia Roma. I was happy to join in, and that is how we started the first Thursday Sai Bhajan Group in 1973 in Mexico. There were five other members, and we followed the bhajans played on the tape recorder. With passion and enthusiasm, we sang bhajans regularly.

As the years passed, the group grew beyond what the Muniz home could accommodate. Dr. Luis Muniz, who was now the President of the Sai Center, had to look for a bigger place to hold the *bhajans* and study circles. Many devotees also started traveling to Swami's *ashrams* in Puttaparthi and Bangalore. Dr. Luis Muniz encouraged us to write letters to Swami and send them. So I wrote a personal letter asking Swami to call me to India where I could see Him up close. And He responded almost instantly!

In 1983, I was offered a scholarship from the Government of India to study Hindi and Literature in New Delhi. I was on my way to India... and Swami!

As soon as I landed in New Delhi, I searched for a Sai Center and found one in Greater Kailash II, not far from where I was studying. I became a regular visitor at this Center. Whenever we had a vacation from school. I rushed to visit the ashram to see Swami and enjoyed the bliss of darshan and sparshan for many days. I would travel by any means available and at the slightest opportunity. Thus, I celebrated Guru Poornima, Dasara, and Christmas with my divine Master.

I also had the opportunity to participate in the First Conference for Bal Vikas Gurus in December 1983 in the divine presence of Swamiji at Prasanthi Nilayam.

# Swami is Always a Call Away

In 1984, I was asked to help a group of 15 Mexican engineers who were staying in the city of Calcutta (Kolkata today) and working on a drilling project with a prominent business in India. The monsoon rains that year turned out to be torrential. "Misery reigns as Calcutta goes underwater and stays submerged for nearly 72 hours," screamed the headlines of a leading newspaper. We were all stuck in the city with absolutely no transportation to leave. After a couple of days of anxious waiting, we were finally scheduled to leave for New Delhi, taking the first available flight after the rains.

At the Calcutta airport, I noticed the clouds were dark and dense, with no daylight in sight! My heart sank. How on earth were we going to leave the city? The monsoon clouds only got thicker and thicker. We boarded the plane and sat in our seats. I was alone with an empty seat next to me, and I decided to ask Swami to be my travel companion. The airplane had hardly taken off when it was jolted violently by the storm. Soon, we all started shaking with the turbulence, being tossed up and down. The overhead compartments started to open, and baggage started falling on us. I started screaming, "Om Sai Ram, Swamiji, be here. Show me Your presence. Oh! Mighty Lord, be here with me!"

# Precisely at that moment, the tray table opened, and a wallet landed and opened to reveal a photo of my Swamiji!

"Om Sai Ram," I shouted again, and someone replied, "Sai Ram, sister! Please do not move now... Stay where you are right now."

The voice was coming from about eight rows behind me. "Yes," I replied, trying to show that I had calmed down.

It took about half an hour for the pilot to regain complete control of the plane. Then, the owner of the wallet came to retrieve it. My hands were trembling as I returned it.

# Why Fear When Sai is Near?

"There is nothing to worry or fear, sister. Can I sit next to you?" he asked.

His name was Captain Kumar. He had taken the same flight from Delhi to Kolkata earlier and was also a devotee from the Sai Center of Greater Kailash II in New Delhi, which I had visited. He began to tell me about what happens during take-off

in such stormy scenarios. He also assured me the situation was not as dangerous as it seemed. I had calmed down completely by now. This was how Swamiji responded to my fear of flying through the storm.

Today, I know that Swami is always with me through all the storms of my life, just like He was with me during that storm in Calcutta. Though I had many opportunities to interact with Swami, I never got a chance to have a photo taken with Him. Whenever I asked Swami to allow me to take a picture with him, He always asked me, "When are you returning to Mexico?" I would answer with the date, which would be weeks away. "Ah!" Swamiji would say. "We still have time!"

As I wait for that picture with Him, He is firmly enshrined in my heart. He is my friend and my guide through the ups and downs of life. Focusing on Him clears my mind of all worries and fears. I know that He is always with me as my eternal companion.

# LOVE IN ACTION





In 2009, an idea of forming a small ladies' choir for a meeting of the SSSIO in Poland blossomed within a couple of years into an international Sarva Dharma Choir consisting of about 45 members from six European countries and India.

From December 27, 2024, to January 5, 2025, 19 members of the Sarva Dharma Choir, joined by four women from Latvia, Lithuania, Switzerland, and Spain, participated in the "Agri Seva Camp" at Sai Prema in Athens. The service activities included gardening, cleaning, and renovating the facilities while they prepared for a concert at the venue. On December 31, they performed the concert, followed by meditation, a bhajan session,



and a joyous celebration of the New Year. As the rain abated and the weather improved, the group planted 40 fruit trees, a labor-intensive task requiring special care, and also completed a few cleaning and painting tasks. The participants described their time at Sai Prema as transformative, balancing service with meaningful excursions and building a sense of home and community.



# **RUSSIA** Spreading Joy and Spiritual Education

In early December, members of the SSSIO's Shanti Center in the Siberian region of Russia conducted a class titled "Good Heart" for children and parents. The session encouraged proactive participation with skits, interactive discussions, and creative activities like "The Tree of Kindness." Participants reflected on good deeds, sang songs, and discussed their desire to continue fostering kindness in their lives. Another SSEHV class was held at a Children's Rehabilitation Center. A creative workshop, "New Year's Bag of Happiness," brought joy to children with disabilities and



their families. Participants crafted decorations using plasticine molding material and decorated pre-prepared New Year bags filled with candies and tangerines. The event spread happiness and love, leaving everyone with hearts full of gratitude for the opportunity to serve and connect.



Between late October and mid-November 2024, the Philippines endured six consecutive tropical cyclones, with Typhoon Kristine (Trami) being the most devastating. It impacted 8.8 million Filipinos, claiming 151 precious lives and severely damaging infrastructure in the Bicol region. Over 37,795 farmers and fishermen lost their basic means of sustenance, while key facilities and roads sustained significant damage.

In response, members of SSSIO in the Philippines partnered with the Missionaries of Charity to deliver aid. Within a week, volunteers prepared 500 grocery bags with essentials such as rice, blankets, and toiletries. Despite logistical challenges, relief supplies were transported from Manila to Naga, a journey of 11 hours. On November 15, volunteers



distributed the relief bags across eight barangays (administrative districts) in Camarines Sur. Using jeepneys (jeeps converted into small buses), tricycles, and boats to navigate flooded areas, they delivered much-needed aid directly to affected households, helping families who had lost their homes and livelihoods.

As the people of Bicol begin the long journey of recovery and rebuilding, these acts of kindness and solidarity serve as beacons of hope, inspiring others to contribute to the healing process.



Since September 2024, members of the Sri Sathya Sai Center of Manhattan in New York, U.S.A. have been spreading joy to patients at Coler Specialty Hospital's Memory Care Unit by celebrating patients' birthdays monthly on the last Saturday of each month. Volunteers collaborate with the unit's recreation therapist to identify patients' birthdays, create personalized cards, bring a cake, and decorate a room with balloons. Familiar music inspires patients, even those with limited mobility, to dance and connect with others.

These celebrations provide much-needed joy and companionship to the residents, particularly those with paralysis or who receive few visitors. Lizette Jaffri, the center's vice president, described the event as a blessing, while other volunteers highlighted the pleasure of witnessing the patients' joy and



participation. Reene, a recreation therapist at the hospital expressed her sincere appreciation, "On behalf of our residents, I extend my heartfelt gratitude to the Sai volunteers for their invaluable time and compassion. These precious moments mean the world to our residents who face daily challenges."



# **Nature's Embrace:**A Satsang of Bliss and Bonding Mauritius

To celebrate the closing of 2024, the Young Adults of the SSSIO Mauritius (SSSIOM) organized a special event. 'A Day with Swami in Nature' was held on December 22, 2024, at the serene Ganesha Spiritual Park in Pointe Lascars. Surrounded by breathtaking ocean views and lush greenery, the park provided the perfect setting for a spiritually uplifting and joyous day. Seventy-five members of the Sai family came together to participate in this special event.

The event started with Vedic chanting, and bhajans invoking Lord Ganesha. Following the bhajans, participants moved under the shade of trees for a deep meditation session. Immersed in the beauty of nature, they attuned themselves to the soothing sounds of the chirping birds, the gentle swishing of the leaves, and the rhythmic sound of waves from the ocean. It was a moment to connect with Swami, experiencing the profound peace that only nature and spirituality can provide. One of the day's highlights was a study circle on the topic-"Does prayer really work?" This interactive session welcomed insights and experiences from children, YAs, and adults alike, making it an enriching discussion. Some of the reflections were:

- "Prayer is really important, but what matters most is being honest and faithful to ourselves while praying. We shouldn't just pray; we should connect with Swami, talk to Him, and trust that He will give us what we truly need."
- "Prayer is everything. I begin and end the day with prayer. It is the foundation of my happiness and survival."



- "Without prayer, life feels incomplete.
   We should be thankful to Swami throughout the day for each moment and each new opportunity to live."
- "Prayer became my lifeline when my child was in the ICU after birth. It was only through prayer that my child was saved. My faith in Swami deepened through this experience."

The collective reflections resonated with a common understanding: Swami, the all-knowing Antaryami (indweller), provides what we need at the right time. Trust and patience are integral to the power of prayer. Since the day was out in nature, fun and laughter were also on the agenda. A lively quiz competition followed, covering topics such as general knowledge, the life of Swami and His teachings, and the history of Mauritius. The day's joyous spirit peaked during the game Bhajan Antakshari, where teams sang beautiful bhajans back-to-back using the ending letter of the bhajan for the next. The joy and devotion in the air were palpable. With no losers in the competition, it reminded everyone that real victory was the divine connection shared with Swami.

This event was a beautiful way to end the year, leaving everyone inspired and spiritually recharged for the year ahead. The memories created, and the lessons learned will surely linger in the hearts of all spiritual aspirants who participated.

# United by Love, Enriched by Diversity

Sri Sathya Sai Baba always emphasized that His mission is not to establish a new religion. Instead, He has sought to guide humanity toward recognizing the universal principles shared by all faithsfostering the brotherhood of man and the fatherhood of God. Swami's divine advent serves to reaffirm this timeless truth for the upliftment of humanity. I have had the privilege of experiencing a taste of this timeless wisdom of 'Unity in Diversity' through several transformative experiences.

In 2013, during the annual Akhanda Bhajans in Toronto, I witnessed this profound truth in action. The interfaith chants from Christianity, Zoroastrianism, Buddhism, Judaism, Islam, and Hinduism created a symphony of spiritual unity. Years later, at the Zone 1 Sai Young Adults Festival in 2019, I witnessed bhajans sung in multiple languages-English, Spanish, French, and traditional Sanskrit or Hindi. These experiences opened my heart and mind, teaching me to embrace all communities, cultures, religions, languages, and the beauty of diversity. They deepened my appreciation for being part of the SSSIO through both online and in-person events, where I have the opportunity to connect with individuals from diverse backgrounds, communities, cultures, religions, languages, and nationalities, drawing inspiration from each encounter and embracing new dimensions of unity.

On May 5, 2024, the Toronto-York Sai Center, one of the centers in my hometown, inaugurated the Sarva Dharma Stupa-a beautiful symbol of unity and spiritual harmony. This stupa is identical in design to the one at Prasanthi Nilayam. Incidentally, the Toronto-York Sai Center was founded on November 23, 1975, the same day that Swami inaugurated the Sarva Dharma Stupa at Prasanthi Nilayam during His 50th Birthday celebrations. The design of the stupa, thoughtfully envisioned by Swami, conveys a profound meaning. The stupa consists of a tall pillar crowned with a lotus flower, representing purity, with an eternal flame at its center, signifying divine wisdom. At the base, sacred symbols of the world's religions signify unity across faiths, while connecting rings represent the yogic discipline needed to unfold the 'lotus of the heart.' Just as the lotus thrives in water without being sullied by it, we, too, should keep our hearts pure and untouched by worldly distractions.

At the inaugural function, the Sai Spiritual Education (SSE) students joined in chanting interfaith prayers, bringing back cherished memories of similar ones I had chanted and heard in the past. The congregation gathered in the prayer hall, and the leaders from different faiths expressed their appreciation for being part of this momentous occasion and blessed the gathering. The inauguration of the Sarva Dharma Stupa was marked by a symbolic ribbon-cutting ceremony at the outdoor premises of the center, led by leaders from the indigenous communities of Canada,



various faiths, and Sai devotees. The bhajan "Sarva Dharma Priya Deva," extolling all forms of faith as divinity, was sung in the prayer hall.

One of the most heartwarming moments of the day occurred when the leaders representing Judaism and Islam gave each other a warm embrace near the altar of the prayer hall. This simple act symbolized the profundity of Swami's words—"There is only one religion, the religion of love." In a world torn by division and conflict, this embrace was a poignant reminder of the peace and unity Swami envisioned for humanity. The applause that followed was an expression of love steeped in the idealism of Swami's teachings.

For me, it was a lesson on the importance of peaceful coexistence for a better world. It also served as a reminder of the need for harmony between humans and Mother Earth, emphasizing the importance of climate action and protecting the environment for future generations. We are united as citizens of this beautiful Earth, regardless of our diversity and nationality.

Reflecting on my experiences at these events, especially on the Sarva Dharma Stupa, I believe it stands as a powerful symbol of Swami's universal message of unity and our shared commitment to fostering harmony across all faiths and communities. 'Unity in Diversity' may sound catchy at the surface level, but it is a profound concept and one of the greatest strengths of the SSSIO. It inspires me to commit myself to building a more inclusive world, one that is devoid of racism, hatred, and discrimination. After all, this planet is home to over 8 billion of us, united by love and enriched by diversity.






